Since Sabine had not received a residence permit on her first holiday, she came back to Letmathe.

After another 4 years she flew to New York and worked at the UN.

During this time we flew to New York every year to visit our daughter.

She married her husband Hans-Josef in New York, already with the idea of travelling or immigrating to Australia together.

Then came the time when Sabine and Hans moved to Australia via Letmathe. Sabine took 2 years' leave from the UN.

After that they stayed in Australia until today.

When Sabine and Hans came to Germany, they always brought lectures about the human rights of the Aborigines.

Whether in Letmathe, Berlin, Brandenburg or Bonn, there were interested people everywhere who listened attentively to the lecture and the videos.

What always tormented Sabine in the last decades was the ascent of Uluru in her younger years.

At that time as a Tourist, she did not know that the holy mountain Uluru only belongs to the Aborigines and should not be climbed.

Even in the last months of her serious illness she asked again for being forgiven which I hereby pass on.

Now we would like to thank all her friends and acquaintances for their friendship with Sabine, this friendship was very precious to Sabine, as she told us.

Especially Cathy and Valerie were always there when they were needed.

We would also like to thank our son-in-law Hans, who, in addition to his work, gave her loving care for a long time and made it possible for her to die at home.
